

the Celtic people living in what today is Ireland, Scotland and Northern France. Back then the Celts practised spiritual beliefs of the Druids. They would celebrate the festival of Samhain (SOW-in) on the midpoint between the fall equinox and the winter solstice, which is November 1st by today's calendar. The festival marked the end of summer harvest and the beginning of the dark half of the year. On the evening of the festival they believed ghosts of the dead would return to haunt the living. To ward off the evil spirits they built huge bonfires and dressed up in costumes.

After the Celts were conquered by the Holy Roman Empire, the Pope declared the occasion as All Hallows Day to honour important people of the church like saints and martyrs. To appease the pagans the church allowed Celtic rituals to flourish thus October 31st became known as *All Hallows Eve* and later *Halloween* where both Christians and Druids celebrated the dead, each in their own way.

Eventually Halloween migrated to North America, however, the ancient spiritual and superstitious rituals soon faded to obscurity. Commercialism took over and today only spooky decorations of the past remain while children gather colossal amounts of candy to binge on.
