CALL CONTROL - A Glimmer of Hope! - editor

It's 4am Sunday. You're sound asleep and your phone starts ringing. Instinctively you answer only to realise it's a scam caller from Florida trying to steal your identity. By now you're wideawake and in a bad mood for the rest of the day!

When you answer a ROBOCALL you may hear a pre-recorded message carefully crafted to solicit a response. Pressing 1 then connects you to a live agent and the scam begins in earnest. Sometimes there is no message but after a brief delay a live agent will accost you with a proposition. Either way – do not engage – hang up! Although the call may be from a legitimate pollster or such, more often than not it's a fraudster seeking information to rob you or steal your identity.



Did you know that Telus offers a free service to silently block computer generated phone calls a.k.a. ROBOCALLS? Just call Telus 1-888-811-2323 any day between 9AM – 7PM and ask your service representative to activate CALL CONTROL on your Home Phone.

Once activated, this is how it works:

CALL CONTROL tests all incoming calls before ever ringing your phone. To determine if it is a real live person the caller is asked to press a specific number key. ROBOCALL devices do not recognise voice commands so the request is not fulfilled in a timely manner and the call is blocked. But if the correct key-press is detected the caller is immediately connected and your phone rings.

CALL CONTROL has features to enhance the efficiency of its operation and reduce annoyances to a legitimate caller.

To begin with, the status of the last twenty-five incoming calls is automatically recorded in a call log. Subsequent calls already listed are immediately allowed or blocked according to previous call log history. Also you can manually store


known phone numbers permanently in a separate ACCEPT or BLOCK list. This is particularly useful to accept callers with dementia or poor English skills.

Occasionally you need to disable CALL CONTROL. For example when you request a call-back if there a is long wait time on a corporate switchboard. You can simply press *99 to turn CALL CONTROL ON or OFF.

To take advange of CALL CONTROL you must:

- ✓ be a Telus land line customer;
- ✓ you must first request Telus to activate the feature;
- ✓ you must have on-line access to manage your profile.

Eventually ROBOCALL technology may circumvent CALL CONTROL, but until then enjoy your privacy.
