Texas Scramble

The main event took place on the nine-hole Executive Course at the Spallumcheen Golf and Country Club. Forty-six players were pre-assigned into teams of three or four to play the *Texas scramble* format. One of the main attractions of this format is that teams are selected with a variation of

expertise. Thus golfers with less ability can participate with little fear of embarrassment or of being a burden to their team. If one golfer

drives deep into the bush there is no issue because the best drive is chosen once each team player takes their shot.


Golf 101

For readers not familiar with the game this is how it works, for example, when there are four players to a team.

The game begins with tee off's by all players of the first team. The elected team captain marks the best drive on the fairway and records who that player was. This player does not take the next shot thus preventing an expert from overwhelming the game. The other three players retrieve their balls and all take their next shots from the same designated location. Again the best drive is marked and the process repeats until a ball lands on the green. Its position is marked and all four players putt from this location in turn. Again the location of the chosen ball is marked and all four player putt from this location. This process repeats until a ball is holed. The team scorecard is then marked with the total number of shots from tee-off to hole. For teams with only three members, the rules are modified to eliminate any disadvantage.

Mulligans

For a fee of five dollars each, a *mulligan* allows a player to repeat the shot if it went really, really badly. This makes the whole game much more relaxed and improves the team's score. Forty-one were needed for this event!

Twenty-four members of S.I. Power Pioneers plus another twenty-two invited players signed up for the tournament. They were pre-assigned to teams of three or four players with specified tee-off times. Thus the first team started play at 12:30 PM and the others followed in 8-9 minute intervals. Jack Roper was enlisted as the game marshal to ensure the play began and progressed in a timely and orderly manner.

Putting Contest

This popular addition to the event is designed to occupy players while not golfing or guests waiting for the Awards Banquet. The action took place on the practice green adjacent to the Snack Shack. Forty-four players each paid the \$5.00 entry fee for three balls plus one practice shot.

Here's how it worked.

The contestant putts from the line at the edge of the green toward a one-yard diameter circle twenty yards away. The first ball that lands within the marked circle advances the player to the next round. If all three balls miss the circle the player is out but can buy in again, and again, until sales close for the first round. Thus ten repeat entries were sold.

After the first round was completed, eight successful contestants played off in round two. By the time the first round was completed the remaining participants were somewhat reluctant to leave the air-conditioned lounge. Nevertheless eight successful contestants returned to the sunbaked putting green to play off round two.

Round two resulted in two players advancing to the final round where they had only one ball to play and the ball closest to the pin won the game.




